Login details

Teachers and pupils can login to Espresso from home by going to https://content.espresso.co.uk/norfolk and

Your child's school subscribes to Espresso Primary — a highly visual resource used in lessons. This service is also available to your child at home. It allows them to continue enjoying what they have been doing in school, while enabling you to be involved in the learning process... and the fun!

What is Espresso Primary?	Espresso Primary is an award-winning digital resource service used in thousands of UK schools. It includes videos, multimedia activities, a weekly news update, printable resources and much more. For further information, please visit: www.espresso.co.uk
What is Home Access?	Home Access enables you and your child to login and explore Espresso from home. It includes a special <i>Home learning</i> area and <i>Parents' guide</i> .
Do I have to pay for Home Access?	No. Home Access is available for all schools that subscribe to Espresso Primary. It is a chargeable feature added to the school's annual Espresso subscription.
Is there anything I need to access Espresso from home?	 A PC or Apple Mac with a minimum 2Mb broadband internet connection One of the following operating systems: Windows XP, Windows Vista, Windows 7 or Apple Mac OS X (Windows 98 and Apple Mac OS 9 are not supported) One of the following compatible browsers: Windows: Internet Explorer 7, Firefox 3.0, Google Chrome 4 or Opera 10 Apple Mac: Safari 3, Firefox 3.0 or Google Chrome 4 The latest version of Adobe Flash
How do I log in to Espresso?	Your school will provide you with your child's login details and the URL to access Espresso from home. Both parents and children share the login details and are able to access the same information.
What if I forget or lose my password?	If you forget your password or have trouble logging in, please contact your school. They will be able to re-issue this to you. Unfortunately, Espresso Education does not keep or issue passwords. Therefore we are unable to answer any login-related queries.
Is the content 'safe' for my child?	Yes. Espresso has been designed specifically for children and uses an appropriate level of language and content. It is curriculum friendly and contains educational, fun and interactive materials. Furthermore, many of our modules have been designed by ex-teachers, who have spent many years working in schools and with children.
